The area of Newcourt includes the late 18th Century Newcourt House, the Exeter Golf & Country Club (opened in 1929) and the former Royal Naval Supplies Depot. The RNSD was constructed in 1943 and operated by the American Navy in preparation for D-Day. It was the largest supply depot in southern England. Half of the Golf Club was acquisitioned by the British Government for the depot. The stores depot was finally closed in 1997. Our street names reflect these links.

Thanks to resident Hannah Johnson who did some of the groundwork on this topic in a school project.

BLAKESLEE DRIVE takes its name from Donald Blakeslee, one of the most decorated fighter-pilots of World War II and the commander of one of the first American fighter squadrons to reach Berlin.

OMAHA (DRIVE) was the name chosen for one of the main landing beaches taken on by American forces on D-Day. A tough assignment, with the beach surrounded by high cliffs, booby-trapped with mines and 'dragons teeth' designed to rip out the base of landing craft. Around 3000 American troops died on Omaha beach that day.



JACK SADLER WAY is named after a young Exeter man, Trooper Jack Sadler (19) was killed in an explosion in December 2007, whilst serving with 4/73 Special Observation Battery, Brigade Reconnaissance Force in southern Afghanistan.

RIVER PLATE ROAD is named after the Battle of River Plate, the first major naval engagement in World War II in 1939.



SEABEE WALK The C-B's job (US Naval **C**onstruction Battalions) was to land soon after the Marines to build major airstrips, bridges, roads, warehouses, hospitals, petrol storage tanks and housing for troops.

JUTLAND WAY The battle of Jutland in 1916 was decisive for the Royal Navy when the British Grand Fleet collided with the German High Seas Fleet off Denmark.

CAROLINE AVENUE HMS Caroline was the last survivor of the battle of Jutland (WWI). She is now a memorial to those who died fighting in both World Wars.



LIBERTY WAY A troop ship during World War II, The Liberty's construction was simple and low cost.





CARNEGIE WALK - named after an American escort aircraft carrier, USS Carnegie, built in 1942-43 and transferred to the UK when she was renamed HMS Empress.

ROBERT DAVY ROAD A Topsham shipbuilder in the 1790s, Robert Davy built 19 warships, including the Batavia. His shipyard closed in 1820. BATAVIA DRIVE



RHODE ISLAND DRIVE The battleship USS Rhode Island was launched in 1904.

RESOLUTION ROAD HMS Resolution was launched on 14 January 1915, the 16th ship to have that name. It also served in WW II.

Newcourt Station

Newcourt Station is a single platform on the west side of the Avocet rail line between *Digby & Sowton* and *Topsham* on the Exeter-Exmouth route. The new station forms part of Devon County Council's 'Devon Metro' project and its main aim is reduce the amount of road traffic, to serve local residents (3,500 new homes), visitors to Sandy Park and other venues/local retailers (eg Ikea).

After many delays - slow worms; bad weather; specification changes; night maintenance trains; public holidays; lack of telephone service - the light can definitely be seen at the end of the tunnel!



The station has everything: Public Address system to assist visually impaired users; Passenger Information Display Screen; Shelter; Help Point; CCTV; lighting (electricity and telephone connection). Platform works were completed at the end of March; adjacent soakaway, disabled car park, footpath work, landscaping and fencing along footpath to steps is expected to be completed by the end of April. Devon County Council is very grateful for local residents' patience and tolerance during the construction.

Following completion by Dyer & Butler, there will be a further short period of snagging and final hand-over to Devon County Council (Project owners), to Network Rail (track and station owner) and then First Great Western (Train Operating Company/current franchise holder). The new FGW operating timetable is available in May and will include Newcourt as a scheduled stop. Local residents are forming a station adoption team (Friends of Newcourt Station) to help keep the station a safe, welcoming and clean environment and there are plans to establish the Community Garden between here and the play area.

The Avocet Line Rail Users Group (ALRUG) represents the interests of Avocet line users and works for improvements to services and facilities. It does this by dialogue and partnership with a number of bodies, including First Great Western, Network Rail, DCC and local, regional and national passenger and rail industry groups such as the Devon & Cornwall Rail Partnership (DCRP) and the Association of Community Rail Partnerships (ACORP). Please consider joining ALRUG and have your say.
