APRICOT & ALMOND TRAYBAKE

Ingredients

About 18-20 dried or 10 fresh apricots (soak dried apricots in boiling water first) 225g caster sugar

4 large free range eggs

240ml olive oil

1 teaspoon almond extract

2 tablespoons plain, natural yoghurt

250g self-raising flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

Zest of orange

Method

1 Pre-heat the oven to 180°C or 160°C fan. Line a rectangular baking tray with baking paper, overlapping the sides (this helps to lift traybake out).

Beat the caster sugar and eggs for 5 minutes, until pale and creamy.

3 Gradually pour the oil and almond extract into the mixture beating continuously. Add the orange zest and yoghurt. Mix together well.

4 Sift in the flour and baking powder a little at a time, and gently fold with a metal spoon until all is thoroughly combined.



5 Pour the cake mixture carefully into the tray. Drain the dried apricots and arrange in lines, (to make it easier to cut up), or fresh ones halved, just on the surface of the mixture, (so they don't sink to the bottom).

6 Bake in pre-heated oven for 40-45 minutes, or until a thin skewer or tooth pick comes out clean when inserted into the centre of the cake.

Lift the traybake out carefully still on the baking paper sheet. Using a serrated knife, gently cut the traybake into about 18 portions. Drizzle melted white chocolate over the slices.

Newcourt Mutual Aid

From January 2020 the Covid 19 virus swept west across Europe, giving us a clear warning of things to come. The UK government began encouraging us to wash our hands properly and stop shaking hands.

To reduce the potential severe impact of the virus, the lockdown was imposed on 23rd March.

In the weeks before lockdown, it became clear that life was going to change for us all, and potentially to become much more difficult for many in our community.

In March, a small group of NCA Trustees and concerned residents 'met'- via phone and video conferencing - to discuss what assistance we could organise for struggling Newcourt residents.

Our concern for those

experiencing difficulty with food shopping, collecting medicines or risking becoming socially isolated, led us to set up a mutual aid group.

The aim: to connect neighbours via a 'Streets Together' initiative, using social media, and a telephone messaging service manned by a core of volunteers.

In order to coordinate and deliver help safely, we compiled guidance for our volunteers, based on reputable sources

Wearing a Face mask

It seems a long time since the National Emergency started and the Country went into lock-down. I trust you have managed to stay safe and well – and occupied!

I want to pay tribute to everybody who is involved in key worker positions – be that NHS, Care, Shops, Drivers, Council Services and many more - thank you, and I applaud you all!

In my role at Devon County Council I have been helping manage our response to the emergency. The modelling suggested that Devon could experience something like 6000 excess deaths (and the associated issues that go with that) - hence the need for many of the actions that were taken. We had to plan for a much worse scenario than actually happened: (i) Domiciliary Care Agencies being unable to provide care – so the prioritisation of need; (ii) hospitals being full -

hence the need to make space and plan additional accommodation; (iii) procurement of a temporary morgue capable of storing several thousand bodies - to name a few. So all the extra planning, work and expense needs to be viewed in this context.

We have managed very well in Devon. A few highlights include getting our hospitals down to 45% occupancy and no one waiting to be discharged! We managed the issues of PPE and the Council became the provider of last resort - offering supplies to any home or provider that was in danger of running out. We also had one of the lowest rates of Care Homes with Covid-19 outbreaks in the country.

I am proud to have announced that we have offered a new contract to our Domiciliary Care Providers that guarantees a minimum of £10/hour for care



workers. And we ran a very successful recruitment campaign to encourage people to enter this rewarding profession.

Devon is now one of the eleven Beacon Authorities asked to lead on the Test, Track and Contain policy to control the future spread of the virus. Although a second wave is by no means certain, we continue to plan for this – though I hope that, if we follow the current measures, we will avoid it.

Stay safe, and as we come out of lock-down, let us hope we can continue to enjoy some of the advantages - more family time, getting to know our neighbours, no daily commute, quieter roads, cleaner air and nature bouncing back – long may those continue.





Sandy Park Hotel

The new £35 million pound Sandy Park Hotel is progressing as planned,

according to Tony Rowe OBE,

Exeter Rugby Club Chairman & Chief Executive.

Work on the state-of-the-art, 250-bed, eight-story development began in mid-January and continues apace, despite the current coronavirus outbreak.

Major groundworks, including the foundations and pilings have already been completed, as has a new drainage pipe under the M5, which will take rain water from Sandy Park Stadium and the hotel into the nearby River Clyst.

By the end of June, the ring beam foundations should also be finished. Then five months of steelworks will be erected, which will show the true scale of the hotel - the next stage in the development plans of Exeter's award-winning Sandy Park complex.

"Things are progressing well on the hotel, despite all that is

happening elsewhere, said Mr

Rowe. "The money we set aside for the hotel was secured and ring-fenced long before Covid-19 and we won't be touching it.

"The work itself is progressing as planned. A lot has happened already since the initial turfcutting in January. I'm pleased to say that we remain on plan to have the hotel open in late 2021 and that the project is still within budget."

In addition to 250 bedrooms, the hotel on Old Rydon Lane will provide leisure facilities on the entry floor, which includes a lounge, a snack and coffee bar, as well as a purpose-built business centre. There will also be a rooftop cocktail bar, together with a Fish & Steak



restaurant that boasts picturesque views down the River Exe Estuary towards Torbay.

"The design of everything has been finalised by a company in London. Many of the fittings we have chosen will be manufactured in Portugal and then fitted here by tradesmen from the West Country." continued Mr Rowe.

"Over these next few weeks and months, people will really see the hotel start to take shape - and that's fantastic news for all of us."
