From the NCA Chairman • December 2021

Dear Newcourt resident

One of the best ways to overcome hardship is to lean on family, friends, neighbours and community. But the pandemic made that difficult. You may have been isolating at home all alone, and social distancing meant you were unable to do things. Whatever your situation, life hasn't been easy.

On the positive side, perhaps you started a new hobby, pursued a new interest and found ways to get by. It's okay if you started to feel hopelessness creep in, though. The first step to dealing with anxiety, stress, or other feelings is to acknowledge them, as to lose

At the Community Festival in September, the Northcott Theatre team and others made a great contribution. And some younger residents have joined Northcott Young Company.

Youth provision has been a concern for many residents, with various efforts since 2012. One of our trustees, Judy Cretney, has worked hard liaising with SPACE, Voice, and YMCA to recruit a youth worker, start a Twilight café - with pizza, games and a safe space for people to hang out. Judy says "We are so close to getting this going!"

I must say a huge public thank you to two amazing people, Ken and Judy Cretney who have done so much for our community. I can only wish them all the best as they move to Scotland in the New Year.

Thanks too to Karen Silcox who has joined the NCA as Project Officer. She says "We have the opportunity to build back stronger in: i) the provision of a community facility, ii) building community connections and iii) campaigning about community infrastructure.

Newcourt is a great place to live because ordinary people like you get involved. Read opportunities in this edition. Perhaps you could even be a trustee? All that is needed is a monthly meeting, (usually first Wednesday evening - with tea & coffee & biscuits). Come to a meeting and see if it's something you'd enjoy.

LYN Love Your Neighbour community food boxes



Filled with surplus food items from local supermarkets by community volunteers...

LYN Box 1 is in the right side passage of Newcourt

Community Centre, behind the high brick wall. **LYN Box 2** is at Trinity School - left of main door.

Food collections are deposited daily in the boxes. Daily updates are put on the LYN Facebook Group with photographs, and occasionally on Trinity Facebook Group.

On Sundays and Mondays there is usually chilled food - offered in short time slots for residents to collect. For more

As it says on the box lid: 'Whatever your reason, please help yourself and in turn, help minimise food waste.'

LYN volunteers do their best to remove any items that go past their 'use by' date. Please follow advice on the box to check all products before consumption. Any items taken at your own risk. "I have spent a lot of time at home over the last year with only a toddler and infant for company." Newcourt resident, Becca recalls. "My husband was working, and I was made redundant just before giving birth to our second child in September. I have found this period very lonely and isolating. I

and isolating. I absolutely love being a mum; but it's noisy, messy, frenetic, and at times, thankless.

So when I saw the request in Newcourt News for volunteers to help with the Newcourt Festival, I put my name forward. (To be honest, I thought I might be able to get out of the chaos of bedtime routine a few times!)

I am so pleased I did. It was a breath of fresh air to get out, meet some new people, talk about anything other than children and use my brain again. I met a delightful group of people, all with different life experiences and interests. I really enjoyed the few evenings as

part of the planning process, as well as volunteering on the day.

I would definitely recommend to anyone who feels a bit lonely, needs a break or quite fancies a chat about something new, to

get involved in any future events... but I didn't get out of bedtimes!"



This new group, linked to Newcourt Community Association, was formally constituted in September. We came together to represent residents at this important phase of the development.

Our mailing list has grown to 125 households, and via our regular mailings we seek to provide residents with a place to raise concerns and to share updates and news.

It is our intention to encourage creative dialogue between the various parties involved on the site and ensure the residents have a voice.

High on our list of priorities is understanding the timeframes and responsibilities relating to the communal 'managed areas' in the Seabrook plans, including the streamside walk, children's play areas, the M5 sound barrier, sports pitches, allotments, overhead power lines and Seabrook Square.

Related to this are the arrangements for the annual rent charge payable by Seabrook property owners to cover communal management costs.

HONEY BEES!

One's first sighting of honey bees swarming, totally filling the air with their movement and noise, is an awesome event.

However, it is in the public's best interest to inform a local beekeeper (bbka.org.uk/swarm) at the earliest sign of a swarm. This is the natural method of reproduction. The bees will have gorged themselves on honey

before the older foragers take the old gueen with them to find a new site, and they will be very docile and easy to re-home.

If left to their own devices, they will find themselves an entrance to your chimney, loft, cavity wall, etc and begin to devalue your home. Since honey is hygroscopic (absorbs water), the one question you must



complete when selling a property is whether it has ever had honey bees in it.

Other visitors to your gardens, and the earliest in the spring, are tree bumblebees, which love your bird boxes to make a nest in. These are lovely pollinating creatures, but not always welcome, and if they have time, beekeepers will often take them away for you. They will all die off in August, so you may enjoy their company for the summer.

Of all the bees, bumblebees and wasps, the honey bees are the only species that exist as a colony over the winter, and have sufficient numbers to pollinate our fruit trees in the spring.

If you are interested in beekeeping, Exeter Beekeepers are running a Beginners' Course at **Newcourt Community Centre** over six evenings in February and March.
