Gardening tips • St Bridget Nurseries

'As the days get shorter and colder, winter is the time for keeping everything warm - including your plants', says Tammy Felloon.

If you have any tender plants - those that will be killed by freezing temperatures (the opposite of hardy plants), think about moving them into a conservatory, or greenhouse, or protecting plants from frost by covering them in horticultural fleece at night. You can put bubble wrap around your garden pots to help keep roots warm and prevent pots from cracking.

If you have a greenhouse, check that your heaters are working. And don't forget to check your outdoor taps too, and consider buying a polystyrene tap cover; they are far cheaper than a plumber!

Making your garden colourful in winter is achievable with winter bedding plants like hardy garden cyclamen, or winter pansies and violas. These plants look fantastic in colourful pots positioned by the door for a joyful welcome.

If you are having a real Christmas tree this year, keep it outdoors for as long as possible to prevent needle drop; and keep it standing upright.

Cut trees last longer if you stand them in a bucket of water, so choose a stand that has a large water reservoir. It is also best to saw a couple of inches (5-7cm) off the bottom of your tree to give a new cut that will soak up water better than an old cut.

If you want the needles to stay on for Christmas, avoid placing your tree near a radiator or fire.



Sandy Park

It has been a busy start to the season on and off the field at Sandy Park. And the New Year looks to be equally exciting with games aplenty and a plethora of events coming up at Sandy Park Conference & Banqueting Centre.

Exeter Chiefs began the new 2018/19 campaign in fine form, and a number of the Chiefs' first team stars have been named in squads for the Autumn Test matches.

Off the field, plans for the exciting, new £25 million Sandy Park Hotel have been approved by Exeter City Council. The state-of-the-art, eight-storey hotel on Old Rydon Lane will house 250 bedrooms and provide leisure facilities on the ground floor, as well as a rooftop cocktail bar and restaurant with views of the River Exe Estuary.

Coming under the Courtyard by Marriott brand, the four-star facility will have an impressive glazed bridge link to Sandy Park, an extensive reception area, open plan bar, coffee bar and lounge.

Exeter Chiefs' Chairman, Tony Rowe, OBE said: "For a number of years, Exeter has had a need for a good four-star hotel within the city. We have got some very nice hotels and some budget hotels, but there's been a growing need for something like the Sandy Park hotel.

"With the growing success of Sandy Park, it became apparent that a facility of this type was needed to run alongside the business. We feel the new hotel will not only enhance the amenities here at Sandy Park, but in the city of Exeter as a whole."

As well as the build of the hotel, the Rugby Club have paid £40,000 for a Road Traffic Order, to ensure that local residents will have minimal interference from Hotel guests.

Mini Broadband Update



Newcourt, including Holland Park (HP1), is mainly served by Openreach Cabinets: No 1 by the Community Centre and No 2 by Ikea. HP2, Seabrook Orchards and Regal Court are served by *fibre to the home*, as will the 20 new Persimmon apartments, via Fibrenest; and the 82 HP3 homes (on the golf practice ground) via Virgin Media.

Cabinet 2 has good availability, Cabinet 1 is reporting (since May) "high demand...working to increase capacity". We are advised that more fibre capacity is targeted for delivery by April 2019. Cabinet 2 users may have difficulty in switching to or between fibre service providers until then.

The Gigaclear fibre to the home target date, originally April-June 2019 has been delayed. A new date has yet to be scheduled.

Neighbourhood Policing - PCSO Anthony Keller

There have been recent burglaries to houses across Greenacres and Great Woodcote Park. Properties have been broken into, instead of the more usual insecure opportunist thefts and we believe are linked to the same offenders. Please remain vigilant, reporting any suspicious activity via 999. Keep valuable items out of view and utilise intruder alarms and CCTV systems where possible. Further advice can be found on our website.

We have been assisting IKEA

during their opening period and associated traffic concerns. This involved planning for 12000+ visitors every weekend during May and June, negotiating the added challenges of the two bank holidays, County Show and Exeter Chiefs' semi-final, whilst ensuring the strategic road network was not brought to a standstill.

We also took measures to ensure residential areas were not overburdened by excess parking issues. Apart from two occasions, parking has been managed well. However, please be mindful that IKFA have no control of vehicles not on their land, and there are no parking controls on

un-adopted roads. Adopted roads will soon be subject to a traffic order with restrictions enforced by Devon County Council parking officers.

Co-cars car club has a network of zero/low emission cars across the South West and two in Newcourt - a Renault Zoe in Albatross Road a Toyota Yaris on Kings Avenue.

The **Zoe** (electric) range is up to 190 miles. Comfortable and quiet, it's great fun to drive. Residential hire rate is £4.75 per hour or £34 per day with free mileage, as long as the Co-cars' on-site charger is used.

The Yaris (hybrid) costs £4.25 per hour or £30 per day, plus 18p per mile. All Co-cars hire costs include fuel, insurance, breakdown cover, road tax and maintenance.

Residential Co-cars membership is only £25 per year, covers up to two people per household and gives you access to any car in the network. To join, complete the online application form at www.co-cars.co.uk/join.
